MENTAL HEALTH INITIATIVE PROGRAM UPDATE

We are excited to announce that our partnership with Driftless Recovery Services has expanded. Brett Knutson and BethAnn Raes, both licensed therapists at Driftless, have agreed to meet with students individually at all of our Aquinas Schools. This has greatly enhanced our mental health services.

In addition, at the high school, a student-led mental health club has started called **Mind Over Matter**. The mission is to promote mental health, by raising awareness, providing support and education and by providing a safe space for students to discuss mental health issues.

About 25 motivated students get together every other week to talk about ways to advocate and support other students. They will lead the effort to bring in speakers of interest to students, such as anxiety, depression and substance use. They have also initiated the "Mental Health Minute" which occurs weekly at Aquinas during lunch in which students can meet freely and casually with a licensed therapist.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month and **Mind Over Matter** has planned several awareness activities.



CATHEDRAL ELEMENTARY

At Cathedral Elementary School, our students are actively engaged in a rich and well-rounded academic program. They explore subjects including religion, mathematics, English language arts, science, social studies, music, physical education, technology, Spanish, art, and guidance. Students in grades 5K-2 take the STAR assessment three times a year to monitor their progress in reading and math. Parents are involved through at least two parent-teacher conferences annually, where we discuss each child's academic, social, and emotional development. We are committed to making families feel welcomed and connected, and we take pride in maintaining consistent communication throughout the year.

Spiritually, our students embrace the traditions and values of our faith. During Lent, they participated in the Stations of the Cross each week and raised money for our sponsored child, Mischell, from Casa Hogar, along with other Diocesan mission initiatives. Six of our students represented Cathedral at the All Schools

Mass, bringing up gifts during the celebration of the Feast of St. Thomas Aquinas. Our second graders completed preparations for their First Communion at our supporting parishes. Once all received this sacrament, we honored Mary with a May Crowning - a beautiful celebration of faith and a meaningful milestone as our second graders near the end of their time at Cathedral.

Our commitment to community service is strong throughout the school year. During Advent and Lent, students collect food and personal care items for organizations such as WAFER, Catholic Charities, and other Diocesan missions. We also enjoy special visits from groups like the Mardi Gras Krewe and the Shamrock Club, giving students the opportunity to learn more about the people and cultures within our local community.

BLESSED SACRAMENT ELEMENTARY

Blessed Sacrament School had a great 2024–2025 school year! We're enjoying the spring sporting season. The camaraderie built through practices, games, and travel continues to strengthen our Aquinas Family. Several of our sixth-grade students are participating in Aquinas Middle School's Track and Field and Tennis teams, helping them form early connections with their future classmates and easing the transition to middle school.

We are also thrilled to have dedicated band and orchestra teachers this year. They were instrumental in preparing students for our Veterans Day Program, as well as the Harvest and Advent Concerts. With approximately 50 students enrolled in these growing elective programs, we are proud to support our students as they explore and develop their musical talents. We were treated to outstanding Spring Concerts at the end of April.

3rd Grade Math

Third graders have completed their multiplication and division facts and will continue to practice them daily. At home, we encourage extra practice with 6s, 7s, 8s, and 9s, which are often the most challenging. They also wrapped up a graphing unit by designing and conducting a survey and graphing the results. Currently, they are working through a measurement unit and will soon move into geometry.

4th Grade Math

Fourth graders are diving into fractions. They are learning to identify equivalent fractions, compare them, and simplify to lowest terms. Soon, they will begin adding and subtracting fractions, including mixed numbers and improper fractions. Throughout this unit, we are continuing to review multiplication and division facts and strengthen critical thinking skills.

3rd Grade Social Studies

Third graders enjoyed creating
Southeast Region dioramas to show
their understanding of landforms,
animals, waterways, and the homes of the
Chickasaw people. Now, they are exploring
the Southwest Region and are looking
forward to creating projects focused
on national parks located in the area.

3rd & 4th Grade ELA Update

In ELA, students have been hard at work mastering verbs, including helping and linking verbs, perfect tenses (past, present, and future), and irregular verbs. Their new skills are being applied in journal writing, where we've seen great progress and confidence. Additionally, students have been improving their cursive handwriting. Many third graders are beginning to write portions of their journals in cursive, while several fourth graders are writing full entries in cursive – an exciting milestone in their writing development.

Physical Education Highlights

In PE this quarter, third and fourth grade students focused on hand-eye coordination by practicing dribbling, balancing, and bouncing with various balls and paddles. It was a joy to see their progression from individual practice to interactive partner activities. Fifth and sixth graders spent the quarter refining their skills in fair play, coordination, and striking control through badminton and pickleball tournaments. The highlight was our first annual Pickleball Bash - an energetic morning filled with competitive matches and excellent sportsmanship. Students also participated in a March Madness-style NCAA Men's Basketball Bracket Challenge during our basketball unit while continuing to develop essential basketball skills like shooting, passing, and dribbling. Their dedication and growth were truly impressive.

Service-Learning and Community Building

Sixth graders led a Christmas-themed service-learning project at Cathedral School, organizing activities such as musical chairs, ball toss, arts and crafts, and BINGO for younger students. This experience beautifully demonstrated the values of Aquinas Catholic Schools and showcased our students' leadership, compassion, and service.

As the school year concluded, we celebrated our faith at May Crowning, honored our active students through field trips and the 5th/6th Grade Track Meet, and recognized academic growth and accomplishments at commencement.



The team started the season with a 1-3 record after playing stiff competition to begin the year, but won 19 straight games in route to a 23-5 record. Under the leadership of our three seniors Brooklyn Rohr, Emma Dobbins and Kathryn Salvodelli, the Lady Blugolds enjoyed another successful season by capturing their 11th straight MVC title with another perfect 12-0 record. In addition, the ladies continued their MVC consecutive win streak which sits at 114 wins in a row. After rolling through regionals and the sectional semi final, their season came to an end with a 4 point loss to eventual state champion Cuba City.

The Blugolds had several players awarded with All-Conference honors headlined by Samantha Davis a 1st team All-Conference and player of the year standout, Emma Dobbins and Ava Fernholz who received 2nd team All-Conference, and Eva Willenbring and Olivia Passehl were also named honorable mention along with Kathryn Salvodelli being recognized as our sportsmanship winner. Samantha Davis was honored for her stellar performance this season by receiving WBCA 1st team All-State honors as well.

Head Coaches: Shandy Scheidt & Connor Lonning **Conference Place Finish:** Girls 2nd, Boys 2nd **Playoff Finish:** Boys & Girls Sectional Champions, Girls runner-up at State, Boys 5th at State

Season Highlights:

The boys' team would win Sectionals for the second year in a row, the 15th time since 2006 and qualify for State for the 17th time. They would finish 5th at State. Declan Gregg would win it all, finishing first in a field of 152 of the best runners in the State, with the second fastest time ever run by an Aquinas runner on the Ridges Golf Course in Wisconsin Rapids. In the 61 years (beginning in 1964) that Aquinas has offered the sport of cross country, there have been 3 state champions: 1997-Anne Faas (now Dr. Anne Schmidt), 2006-Zachary Wilhelmy, and now, in 2024, Declan Gregg. For the second consecutive year and the 7th time since 2007, the girls team won Sectionals and qualified for State for the 10th time. The girls 2nd place finish at State was the Aquinas girls' cross country team best finish ever since Aguinas entered the WIAA in 2000; previous best finish was in 2014, 4th place. The girls 2nd place point total was only 3 points behind first place. 



Our Season of Love When We Needed It Most

Just when we start to lose faith in humanity, we get a sign of hope that human love is here to stay.

The greatest gifts in life are right in front of us, if we let them in.

In March 2001, my dear friend Ann invited me and another friend to dinner and then to see the award-winning Broadway production of RENT at the Ordway in St. Paul. This musical featured the song Seasons of Love. The lyrics propose measuring a year of life as 525,600 minutes, celebrating each moment in a year of life in cups of coffee, laughter, and strife. What a delightful sentiment to relish those wondrous moments of joy, sorrow, and the mundane in life.

This play's profound message struck Ann and me deeply, moving us to tears by the end of the show. Its powerful message iterated how we must treat each other with compassion, lift each other up, and support each other when we're down, regardless of our differences. It pointed to the force of true human love. What an amazing gift this must feel to receive. I couldn't imagine what it would be like. Would I even know it to fully take it in?

Twenty-four years later, through prednisone-filled hallucinations and sleeplessness while recovering from my kidney transplant, this memory came back to me. My family, closest friends, and wider circle of friends had freely and authentically expressed such human

love and kindness to both me and my donor, sending prayers and well wishes. It filled my heart beyond what I knew I could possibly feel. This could only be my very own season of love until I realized it wasn't mine alone. Here's how it came about.

Wanted: Living Kidney Donor

I started my evaluation for a living kidney donor on November 20, 2023. A month later, when I received word that I made the transplant list, I reflected on my life and whether I deserved such a gift. I prayed I was a decent human being who gave back and cared for, supported, and inspired others.

Deep in my soul, I knew I had a lot to live for, but who could consider giving me their kidney? I didn't want anyone to feel obligated or pressured to make such a sacrifice. At best, I hoped for an altruistic donor as that's the only person I could imagine coming forward.

When I told Ann about needing a donor, she said without hesitation, "I'll do it! ... but only if I'm a direct match." That's my Ann. I didn't expect her to say anything different. She's that way, always cheering on and supporting her friends when they're down. It comes naturally to her as her whole family is so full of love.

I understood her pause because becoming a donor required time, as well as spiritual and self reflection, not to mention rigorous medical testing. She signed up and started testing in August 2024.

A Humble, Selfless Gift

I was careful to give Ann space to process what she was experiencing as she progressed through testing. We spoke often on the phone, but we didn't dwell on the transplant, apart from what her next steps were.

As December 2024 rolled around, I knew the transplant and donor teams would meet soon and I'd find out how Ann fared through the process. My instincts—not the most reliable source—told me we weren't a match.

Ann and I made plans to catch up on Thursday, December 19. When she called, we talked for almost an hour about everything but the transplant. That wasn't unusual for us because we always had a lot to catch up on. Little did I know my husband was listening in and secretly wished we'd get on with it already.

Then, she said, "Last week I found out I'm a match. I know I should have told you sooner, but I needed to process everything, especially the guidance from my medical team and mentors. I also needed time to deeply reflect on and pray about whether I wanted to become a donor. So, I've decided I want to give you my kidney."

To know Ann is to know that, apart from her fun-loving personality, she is a selfless, thoughtful person, full of love, kindness, and humility. In the very moment she vowed to be my donor, the universe aligned, angels sang hallelujah, and harp strings flourished. All was right in the world, proven not just by science, modern medicine, or good genes, but by a much higher force. It was God's will.

It made sense. Ann and I had been part of each other's lives since we were toddlers, back when I lived on 16th and Market in my hometown of La Crosse, WI. We played basketball against each other in middle school and reunited in high school.

In the late '80s, Ann and I both transferred to UW-Eau Claire and ended up being roommates. During our 20s, we shared many adventures together and gallivanted around the Uptown neighborhood of Minneapolis where Ann lived.

A Waterfall of Prayers, Love, and Support

Despite Ann's declaration to become my donor, I sensed an uncertainty in her voice—like she wasn't convinced yet. I didn't fault her because it was a big decision not to be made lightly. She told me how she turned to her faith to guide her through the process. For her as for me, it was a mind, body, and spiritual journey to face our fears about the screening process and look at the positives to come from it.

When I spoke with Ann in January, she said: "We're going to put faith over fear. Let's do this!" That's all I needed to hear.

This story was no longer about me; it was about us and forever would be. We were about to enter a new level in our friendship, promising to always be there for each other. I felt complete gratitude to Ann and God for saving me, and I'd forever be indebted to Ann for her incredible gift.

I posted a simple update to Facebook and kept Ann anonymous because she wasn't quite ready to go public. Then, on the night before our last round of tests, Ann posted her news to Facebook. The word was out, and the response was tremendous with Ann's friends and family and mine wishing us well and praying for us. We were filled with an abundance of love and support from every person who responded-people who knew Ann, not me; people who knew me, not Ann; and people who knew us both. To see so much unity and kindness over our friendship and journey was equally moving as it was motivating.





Once in a Lifetime

This journey was built on faith in each other, in our care team, and our friends' and families' support. Putting prayer and positivity forward was the only way Ann and I knew to go about this journey because what-ifs and worry don't solve anything.

Ann and I had no words as we received the outpouring of love, prayers, well wishes, and words of kindness. I only knew to be grateful and give thanks to God for his blessings, for watching over us, and for giving us strength and courage.

Ann and I had experienced the most incredible gift of love and kindness—our very own season of love—knowing it's an absolute gift in any lifetime. We knew it, we let it in, and we let it fill our hearts and our spirit. While it might seem like a once-in-a-lifetime event, we're committed to it for the rest of our lives.

Ann and I are convinced that, despite the disruption, nonsense, and hate swirling around in the news, peace, love, and kindness will always win and unite us as humans. These beautiful, selfless qualities will prevail if we are open to both receiving them and giving them freely. That is the season of love.

Reduce or Eliminate Income Taxes on Your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD)

Paying taxes on your IRA distribution is now a little less required. When you choose to make a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) rather than take your RMD, you will not pay income tax on it.

Replace Your IRA's RMD with a QCD

Just as you would take a QCD to offset your IRA RMD, you can apply some or all your QCD to a charitable gift annuity (CGA). The CGA gives you fixed payments for life at favorable rates.

With a QCD, you distribute money from your IRA, but rather than take the funds yourself, you distribute them to a beloved organization of your choice. When you do, you receive benefits for your charitable decision.

The QCD applies only to IRAs. However, it is possible to transfer funds from other accounts to your IRA to take advantage of this option. Call your financial planner or our office for more information.

While the rules regarding the QCD and the QCD to CGA are relatively simple, you must follow them exactly. Your financial planner can help you learn the details, and can tell you the maximum amounts you can use.



Qualified Charitable Distribution

Turn your IRA rollover required minimum distribution into annual income

You pay no income tax on the distribution

You don't have to apply all of your RMD to your QCD If your spouse has an IRA, he or she can make a QCD as well

While it is a good idea to avoid paying taxes on an RMD, what if you could do even better? What if you could change your RMD (or what would be your RMD) into payments for life? While the IRS likes acronyms (IRA, RMD, QCD), let us give you one of ours you will love. It is the CGA. It stands for charitable gift annuity, and it gives you something even better than the QCD.

The QCD Gives You a Choice

- You pay no income tax on the distribution. We also pay no tax.
- You don't have to apply all your RMD to your QCD. You can distribute some to our organization and some to yourself, paying income tax on that amount.

Other Things to Keep in Mind

- The maximum amount you can use changes each year. Contact us for this year's limit.
- The distribution must be made to the nonprofit. You need to make sure the organization is a qualified 501(c)(3) charity, like ours.
- Because you never paid income tax on the QCD, you will not receive an income tax deduction.






